The hotel has a limited number of wheelchair-accessible rooms. If you need such a room, make your reservation as soon as possible.

The League rate is good for three days before and three days after the convention if rooms are available. Room reservations may be cancelled 24 hours prior to your scheduled arrival. Departure date may be changed at checkin without penalty. Changes to departure after check-in will result in a fee.

Standard wireless internet and free self-parking are included for League convention attendees. Each room has

a coffee pot and mini-fridge. The resort golf course will be closed during the convention.

HOTEL PARKING

CONVENTION SPEAKERS

Steven Marking - A "Visit from Will Dilg"

Will Dilg was the driving force behind and the first national president of the Izaak Walton League of America. In 1924, he led an unprecedented grassroots campaign to establish the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge. One hundred years later, the refuge is an anchor for conservation



and bastion for outdoor recreation along the river in Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Drawing on impassioned speeches and editorials in *Outdoor America* magazine, Marking brings Dilg to life describing the imperiled environment along the upper Mississippi River in the early 1920s and the extraordinary campaign to convince Congress to establish the Refuge. As importantly, Marking channels Dilg to talk with audiences today about the important work ahead to conserve natural resources, fish and wildlife, and special places for future generations.

Millicent Sparks – "Harriet Tubman: Living History Experience"

Harriet Tubman's life and legacy are deeply rooted in Maryland from her early life as a slave on the Eastern Shore to her extraordinary bravery as a "conductor" on the Underground Railroad freeing more than 70 slaves from this region over a 10-year period. Millicent Sparks' portrayal of Harriet



Tubman blends accounts of special events in Tubman's life with an acute sense of Tubman's personal qualities – her emotional depth, profound spirituality, immense intelligence, extraordinary dignity and astounding courage.

Jeff Janvrin, Mississippi River Habitat Specialist, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources

Throughout a career spanning nearly 35 years, Jeff Janvrin has coordinated Wisconsin's participation in the selection, design and monitoring of over 40 federally funded Upper Mississippi River Restoration Habitat Rehabilitation and Enhancement Projects. He does much of his work



in the field along 231 miles of river in Wisconsin. Janvrin actively promotes awareness of Mississippi River history and management through presentations, publications and development of a Mississippi River activity guide for formal and non-formal educators.

Peter Tango, Monitoring Coordinator, Chesapeake Bay Program

Since 2006, Peter Tango has served as a liaison between the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Geological Survey as Chesapeake Bay Monitoring Coordinator. In this role, he leads a wide range of teams and workgroups for the Chesapeake Bay Program partnership addressing issues related to monitoring,



management, science and policy focused on the health and restoration of the Bay watershed. Tango is at the forefront of engaging volunteer water quality monitors and ensuring the data they collect is used in combination with other data to assess the health of and inform management decisions related to the Bay watershed.

Teresa Seidel, Director, Great Lakes National Program Office, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency

Teresa Seidel is the Director of the Great Lakes National Program Office at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in Chicago. The Great Lakes National Program Office brings together federal, state, tribal, local and industry partners under the strategic framework of the Great



Lakes Restoration Initiative to improve water quality, remediate seriously polluted sites, combat invasive species and restore native species and their habitat. Before leading the Great Lakes Program, Seidel was the Director of the Water Resources Division at the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy.

Marcia Pradines Long, Chesapeake Marshlands National Wildlife Refuge Complex Project Leader, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service

In this position since 2016, Marcia Pradines Long has focused on strengthening relationships with the community, helping new audiences get engaged with the outdoors through programs like mentored hunts and finding the connections between people and wildlife that



make conservation successful. The Complex consists of the Blackwater, Eastern Neck, Martin and Susquehanna National Wildlife Refuges. In her spare time, Long is an avid hunter, angler and a mentor for other women learning to hunt.

CONVENTION DELEGATES AND BUSINESS

DELEGATE ACCREDITATION

Delegates are the IWLA chapters' official representatives at the national convention, and they play a key role in determining the League's direction for the coming year. In addition to electing national officers, delegates serve on committees and vote on conservation policy resolutions.

Chapters may elect or appoint their delegates. The number of delegates allotted to each chapter is determined by the chapter's size. (Allotments are listed on pages 9-10.) Allotments are based on membership figures from the end of the previous year.

After a chapter has named its delegates, the delegate accreditation form on page 11 must be completed by a chapter official and submitted to the national office by **June 30, 2024**. Delegates also must present a signed accreditation form at the delegate registration table to receive delegate credentials.

YOUR VOICE IN LEAGUE POLICY

Every year, Ikes, chapters, and divisions draft resolutions outlining

recommendations to local, state, and federal agencies and others about various natural resource issues. Each resolution submitted is considered by an appropriate resource committee composed of members appointed by the League's national president. The resource committees are the following:

- Fish and Wildlife
- Public Lands
- Sustainable Resources
- Agricultural Affairs
- Energy and Environment
- Water Resources
- Outdoor Ethics
- Environmental Education

A separate Resolutions Committee – consisting of the chairs of each resource committee – makes final recommendations on resolutions before they are presented to convention delegates for a vote. Dale Braun of Iowa is chair of the Resolutions Committee. Resolutions that are formally adopted become

official League policy and guide the position statements of League staff, officers and members.

BYLAWS CHANGES

The national Izaak Walton League of America bylaws (Section 18.1) stipulate that any proposed amendment to the national bylaws must be received by the Chair of the Governance and Bylaws Committee and national office at least 45 days prior to the meeting at which the proposed amendment is to be considered.

The deadline for submission of any amendment for consideration at the national convention is May 31, 2024.

VOTING AT THE CONVENTION

Each delegate is entitled to one vote. However, if the number of chapter delegates at any session is less than the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled, the chapter delegation may collectively cast the same number of votes as the number of delegates to which that chapter is entitled.

Each chapter is entitled to name one alternate for each delegate. However, an accredited alternate may vote only in the absence of the original delegate. (For more specific information about the voting rights of delegates and alternates, see Article 7 of the IWLA Bylaws.)

Major actions of delegates include voting on adoption of convention rules; approving minutes from last year's convention; electing national officers and directors at large; voting on policy resolutions; and voting on the national convention site.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors is composed of the national president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary, in addition to past national presidents, national directors, and directors at large. The directors will hold a short meeting during the convention.

Major actions of the Board include

approving minutes of the midwinter meeting, voting on proposed bylaws amendments, and electing Executive Board members.

IWLA ENDOWMENT BOARD

All members of the League are also members of the IWLA Endowment Inc., a separate corporation that receives earmarked and general contributions for financing conservation projects. The Endowment Board will hold a meeting during the convention, and a slate of candidates for election to the Board will be presented. Any Ike at the convention may vote for the candidates.

LOOKING FOR LEADERS

NATIONAL OFFICERS

Executive Board Chair Jim Piateski has made the following appointments to the National Officer Nominating Committee: Rodger Moran (Md.), chair, Robert Chapman (S.C.), Luann Noll (III.), Bill Kelly (Idaho), Jill Padgette (Va.), Kim Russell (Ind.) and Cherie Aker (Md.). The committee is responsible for proposing a roster of candidates to serve one-year terms of office in the following positions:

- National President, who presides at meetings of the Board of Directors and must project a strong image for the League.
- Vice President, who substitutes for the president and performs other duties assigned by the president or Executive Board.
- Secretary, who keeps permanent records of all business transacted by the Board of Directors, Executive Board, and at annual meetings.

NOMINATING FORM

 Treasurer, who provides general oversight of League financial and budget processes.

The National Officer Nominating Committee is also responsible for presenting a roster of candidates for positions of directors at large. Directors at large represent the interests of states without divisions on the Board of Directors. Terms are three years, and there are **three vacancies** this year.

EXECUTIVE BOARD

National President Jodi Labs has made the following appointments to the Executive Board Nominating Committee: Garrit Struck (III.), chair, Lisa McIntyre (Iowa) and Marie Cyphert (W.Va.).

The committee will present a roster of candidates for **three open positions** this year. The 14-member Executive Board, which includes four national

officers, has full administrative and supervisory responsibility for the national office of the League. Executive Board members must be members of the Board of Directors. They are elected to three-year terms.

INSTRUCTIONS

Both delegate accreditation forms must be filled out by a chapter officer. On each form, the officer should:

- 1. Print the name(s) and membership number(s) of the chapter's delegates. Delegate must be a member in good standing.
- 2. Assign each delegate a number of votes. The total of all delegates cannot exceed the total allocated to the chapter. (See Delegate Allotments.)
- 3. Enter the chapter's name and number.
- 4. Reproduce enough certificates so each chapter delegate and alternate has a copy to bring to convention. (Reproduce forms before the officer has signed the certificate.)
- 5. Have a chapter officer sign each certificate and provide his or her title. Each certificate must have an original signature. Without the signature, the certificate is not valid.
- 6. Print the name and address of the person signing the certificate.
- 7. Give each delegate and alternate a signed certificate to take to the convention.

TRAVEL TIPS

To ensure smooth sailing in July, we have a few tips when driving to Cambridge, Maryland.

Plan around peak travel times: Maryland's Eastern Shore is a popular summer destination for people throughout the Washington, DC region, and traffic is especially busy on the weekends. Friday afternoon/evening and Saturday morning are peak travel times going east across the Bay Bridge and on Routes 50 and 301 toward the convention site in Cambridge.

If you plan to arrive at the convention hotel on Sunday, July 14, there will be much less traffic toward Cambridge on Sunday morning. If you plan to arrive at the hotel on Saturday, avoid traveling in the direction of Cambridge on Saturday morning.

Crossing the Bay Bridge: U.S. Route 50, which is the most commonly used major road toward the

Eastern Shore, crosses the Chesapeake Bay Bridge.
Traffic congestion approaching the bridge has been substantially reduced through "highway speed tolling" using E-Z Pass, Pay-By-Plate or Video Tolling.
(Cash payment is NOT accepted.) The Maryland
Transportation Authority Bay Bridge website baybridge.
maryland.gov has useful travel tips, including notes about peak travel times and real-time traffic information.

Driver assistance crossing the Bay Bridge: The Kent Island Express is a paid service that will drive your car (and you!) over the Bay Bridge. Visit kentislandexpress. com. Call (410) 604-0486 one hour before you expect to reach the bridge. The fee for this service is \$40 cash / \$50 credit card and additional fees apply for trips between 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. (which are by advance appointment only).
